 - *Integration of Aboriginal artwork in all targeted communications.*
 - *Delivery of PUTUWA Communications plan and resources, digital assets, and merchandise for Aboriginal women.*
 - *Delivery of funding arrangement to SAS for ACHHO/AMS and Support the Girls collaboration.*
 - *Delivery of mobile van reskinning and media event with Health Minister and local community elders.*
 - *Monitoring of staff participation in cultural safety training.*
 - *Evidence of knowledge sharing and learning opportunities between SAS' to improve cultural safety.*

- Were there any barriers or enablers that impacted on the ability of your service to progress the required actions?

- In what ways were Aboriginal women in NSW and key Aboriginal organisations made aware of the change in screening eligibility for Aboriginal women aged 40-49 years?
