Year End Handoffs: Understanding Patient Characteristics Associated with Transfer from Resident to Attending Primary Care Panels

Resident Survey

Each year, in anticipation of the new academic year, we ask all PJC residents to review their primary care panels, which includes potentially recommending patients for transfer to attending primary care physicians (PCPs). We are studying the process of transferring patients from resident PCPs to attending PCPs, with the goal of standardizing a workflow to identify and transfer patients to attending PCPs each academic year. For this reason, we are sending a survey to understand what factors contribute to recommendation for transfer to attending PCP. The survey should take less than 5 minutes. The survey is optional and voluntary. All information will be kept confidential and used to improve the ambulatory experience at the Jen Center.
